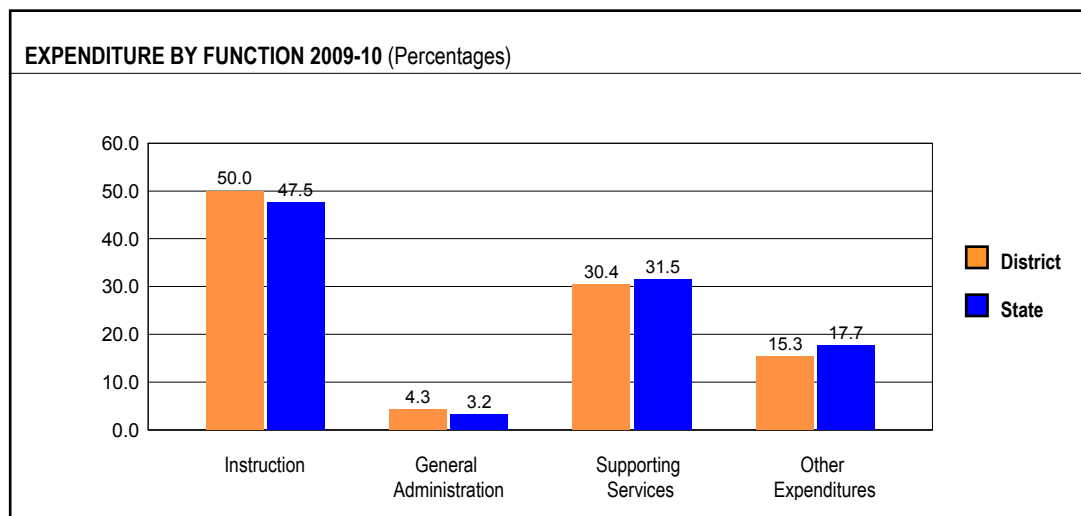

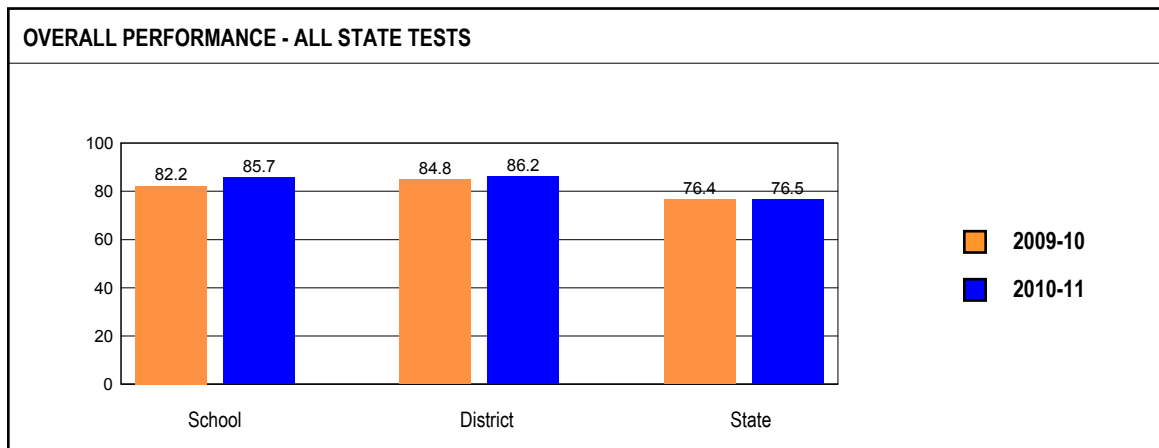

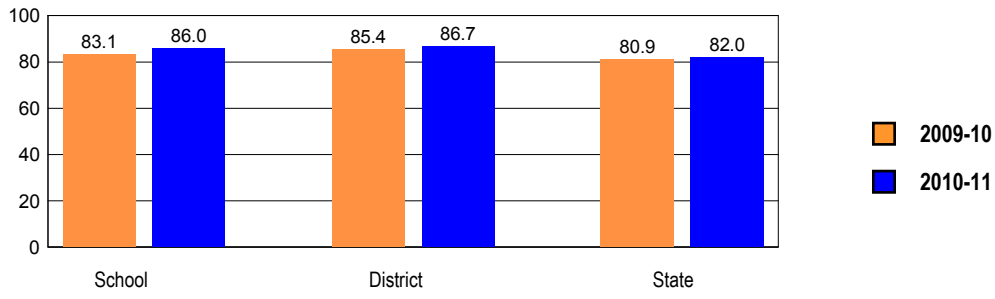

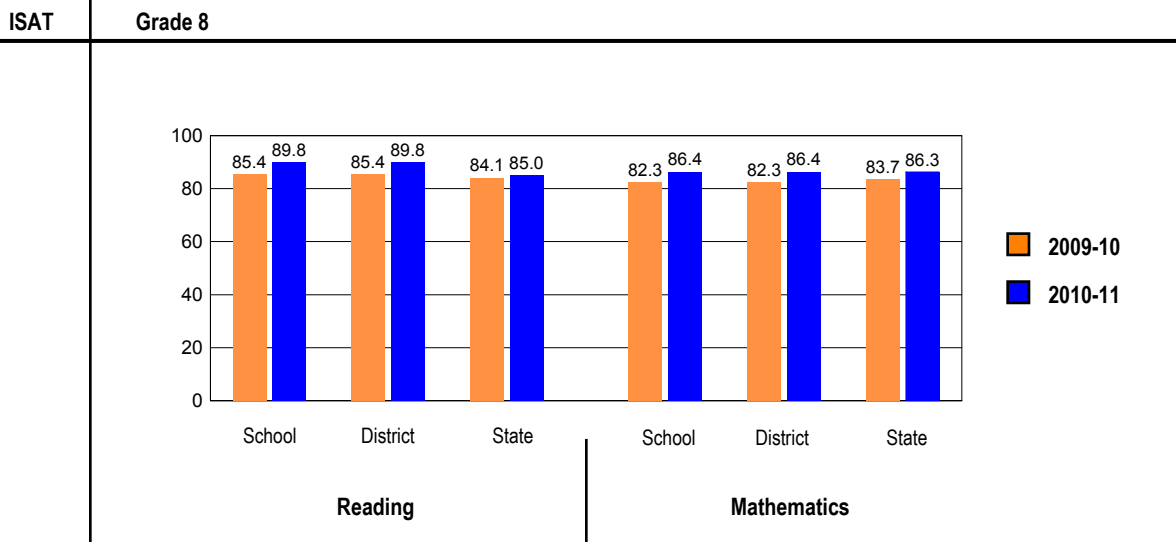
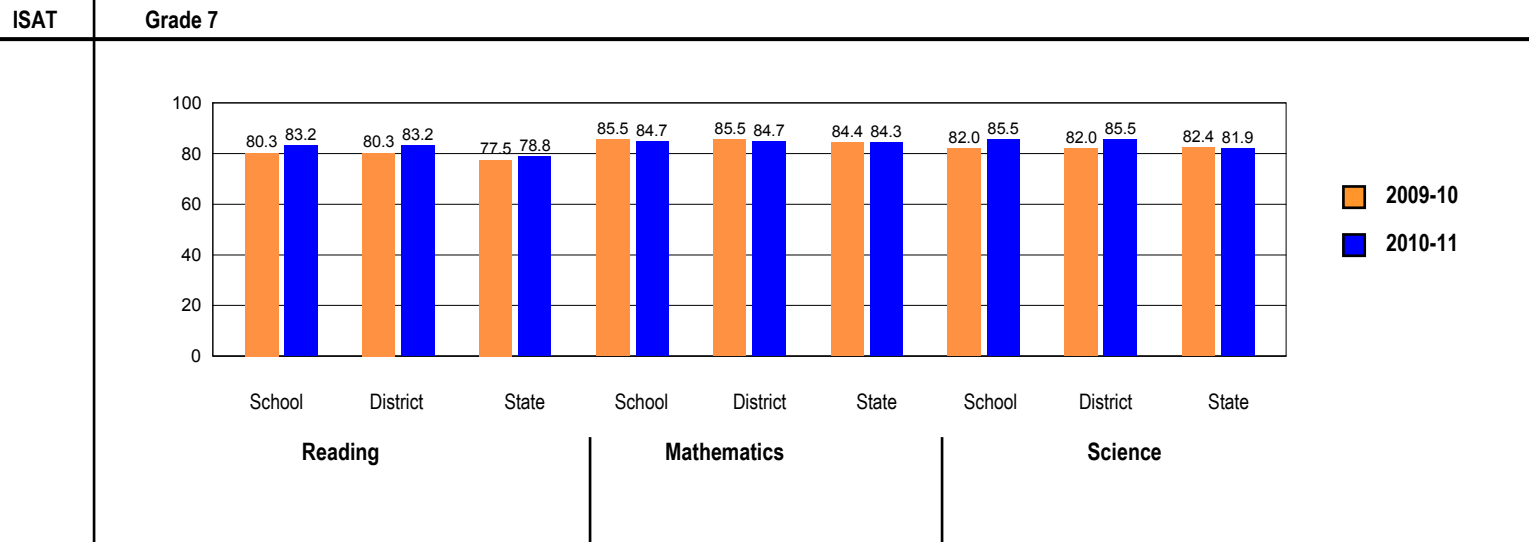


OVERALL ILLINOIS STANDARDS ACHIEVEMENT TEST (ISAT) PERFORMANCE



ISAT PERFORMANCE

These charts provide information on attainment of the Illinois Learning Standards. They show the percents of student scores meeting or exceeding Standards for the grades and subjects tested on ISAT.

**PERFORMANCE ON STATE ASSESSMENTS**

Federal law requires that student achievement results for reading, mathematics, and science for schools providing Title I services be reported to the general public.

The Illinois Standards Achievement Test (ISAT) is administered to students in grades 3 through 8. The Prairie State Achievement Examination (PSAE) is administered to students in grade 11. The Illinois Alternate Assessment (IAA) is administered to students with disabilities whose Individualized Education Programs (IEPs) indicate that participation in the ISAT or PSAE would not be appropriate.

Students with disabilities have an IEP (No Child Left Behind Act). An IEP is a written plan for a child with a disability who is eligible to receive special education services under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act.

Reading and Mathematics are tested in grades 3 through 8 and 11. Science is tested in grades 4, 7, and 11.

In order to protect students' identities, test data for groups of fewer than ten students are not reported.

ILLINOIS STANDARDS ACHIEVEMENT TEST (ISAT)

The following tables show the percentages of student scores in each of four performance levels. These levels were established with the help of Illinois educators who teach the grade levels and learning areas tested. Due to rounding, the sum of the percentages in the four performance levels may not always equal 100.

- Level 1 -- Academic Warning - Student work demonstrates limited knowledge and skills in the subject. Because of major gaps in learning, students apply knowledge and skills ineffectively.
- Level 2 -- Below Standards - Student work demonstrates basic knowledge and skills in the subject. However, because of gaps in learning, students apply knowledge and skills in limited ways.
- Level 3 -- Meets Standards - Student work demonstrates proficient knowledge and skills in the subject. Students effectively apply knowledge and skills to solve problems.
- Level 4 -- Exceeds Standards - Student work demonstrates advanced knowledge and skills in the subject. Students creatively apply knowledge and skills to solve problems and evaluate the results.

Four Conditions Are Required For Making Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP):

1. At least 95% tested in reading and mathematics for every student group. If the current year participation rate is less than 95%, this condition may be met if the average of the current and preceding year rates is at least 95%, or if the average of the current and two preceding years is at least 95%. Only actual participation rates are printed. If the participation rate printed is less than 95% and yet this school makes AYP, it means that the 95% condition was met by averaging.
2. At least 85% meeting/exceeding standards in reading and mathematics for every group. For any group with less than 85% meeting/exceeding standards, a 95% confidence interval was applied. Subgroups may meet this condition through Safe Harbor provisions. ***
3. At least 91% attendance rate for non-high schools and at least 82% graduation rate for high schools.

* Includes only students enrolled as of 05/01/2010.

** Safe Harbor Targets of 85% or above are not printed.

*** Subgroups with fewer than 45 students are not reported. Safe Harbor only applies to subgroups of 45 or more. In order for Safe Harbor to apply, a subgroup must decrease by 10% the percentage of scores that did not meet state standards from the previous year plus meet the other indicators (attendance rate for non-high schools and graduation rate for high schools) for the subgroup. For subgroups that do not meet their Safe Harbor Targets, a 75% confidence interval is applied. Safe Harbor allows schools an alternate method to meet subgroup minimum targets on achievement.

Central Junior High has failed to make AYP for the 2011 school year. The “students with disabilities” subgroup did not meet standards in reading and math through Safe Harbor. The 2010-2011 school year was the second full year of MAP assessment for Central Junior High. On the average 55% of students met their target growth in reading and 54% of the students made their target growth in math. Though there were some gains in the tested areas, there is room for improvement and it is expected that more of the students will be achieving their target growth in the spring of this year.

As the ISAT results are examined, there is a need to address the deficiencies to ensure that progress continues at Central Junior High. The district as a whole is utilizing more and more data to focus instruction. Continued use of AIMSweb and MAP (Measures of Academic Progress) will give individualized information to teachers and staff. These tools will allow instructors to focus directly on the strengths and weaknesses of every learner. Each student will receive a Student Goal Setting report. This report will be reviewed with the individual teacher. Goals will be established for each student. AIMSweb and MAP data, along with classroom observation, will play a key role in a multi-tiered early intervention model that focuses on addressing student needs immediately. In addition, teachers have submitted action plans for their classes which include goals for each individual class.

District 124 utilizes a research based reading series specifically designed to focus on the five components of literacy. This curriculum ensures that all needed materials are in the hands of the teachers so that their focus can be on instruction designed to meet the needs of all learners. Central Junior High has integrated READ 180, an intensive reading intervention program, specifically designed for students that need intensive support. Individual needs are addressed through differentiated instruction, adaptive and instructional software, high-interest literature, and direct instruction in reading, writing, and vocabulary skills. In addition, a Reading Plus quarters class has been added to the curriculum which focuses on reading strategies and interventions.

Central Junior High is committed to improvement. Our instructional strategies and programming will continue to evolve and student learning will improve. We will focus on individual learners and their growth, while providing extension opportunities through differentiation across the curriculum for students who are performing very well.
